



- 1. Introduction by Haakon A. Ikonomou
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We have had an exciting start to HUM:Global. At the heart of our endeavour is the Professional Project Group (PPG): two members from each department at the Faculty of Humanities. We meet twice per semester to hammer out the programme of research, teaching and dissemination plans for the short term and for the longer term. The PPG has also had the privilege of giving seed money to four worthy applicants - projects we are excited to follow in 2024/25.

Over the next year, the PPG will embark on their own projects within the HUM:Global framework. Beyond this we have also put together a stellar series of talks and events (HUM:Global *Talks!*) and a well-attended and inspiring semester lecture. These kinds of activities will be mainstays of HUM:Global in the coming years.

We are also reaching out to other institutions, to build partnerships for the future. One such partnership is with the global historians at Lund University, whom we hosted in April 2024, and another is with UN City in Copenhagen, where we recently collaborated on a film for their <u>docUNight</u> series.

There is not enough space here to list all our activities, but we are still running and still getting dressed, and thus still in the making. We hope you get a good insight into HUM:Global from our first annual report – enjoy the read!









2. Communicating HUM:Global

3. Global Humanities BA Elective

In spring 2024 the Humanities Faculty at UCPH announced the possibility to develop new BA electives (45 ECTS). The HUM:Global secretariat and Professional Project Group (PPG) immediately responded to the call and organised a writing retreat at Hornbækhus to prepare an application to be submitted in August.

As well as spending two days brainstorming, sketching, collective writing, and ultimately carving out a first draft application, we enjoyed getting to know one another better in beautiful surroundings over good food and stimulating discussion.

If successful, the Global Humanities BA Elective will be taught by researchers from the Department of Cross Culture and Regional Studies, the Saxo Institute, the Department of Arts and Cultural Studies, the Department of Communications and the Department of English, Germanic and Romance Studies.








5. HUM:Global Talks!

The HUM:Global *Talks!* are co-hosted with our partners at the different departments at the Humanities Faculty who have organized talks that are open to all faculty, students and staff at the University of Copenhagen as well as external stakeholders and the general public.

HUM:Global supports the organizers by spreading news about the globally-oriented talks to a wider, cross-disciplinary audience, and, when possible, documents the talks in pictures.

In the 2024 spring semester, we supported seven talks from the Departments of Communications, of Arts and Cultural Studies, of Cross-cultural and Regional Studies, and Global History at Saxo. We witnessed large audience numbers (20-50 pers. at each talk) and indeed a broader cross-section of students, researchers and guests from in and outside of academia.







6. HUM:Global Seed Money

HUM:Global Seed Money is an opportunity for researchers and students at the Faculty of Humanities to receive grants of between DKK 10,000 and DKK 35,000 to start new initiatives at the University of Copenhagen.

This year we received 14 applications from early career and senior researchers. After an evaluation by the Professional Project Group (PPG) in June, the decision was made to allocate a grant of 17,500 DKK to four projects:

7. HUM:Global Launch

Our public conference **Narrating Global Conflict** sought to explore and connect how different professions narrate conflicts across time and space. Artistic expressions, personal accounts, and academic and professional analysis were taken equally seriously. The conference succeeded in both to unpacking their innate qualities as sensemaking practices and we witnessed many examples of how they blend across a digitized, globalized interactive space to create sustained tropes of conflict and resolution in our time.

Our aim was to sustain a dialogue between perspectives on the global conflict at a historical moment when professional compartmentalization, ideological schisms and political naming and shaming risk tearing the critical, free, frank and interrogative exchange that universities are meant to lift apart, and we achieved it!


